Course Description	<p>The Seminar is an optional 1-credit course that counts toward the 124-credit graduation requirement and requires advisor approval for enrollment. Designed as a skill-building experience, it equips students with advanced research competencies across disciplines, including research design, methodological application, academic writing, critical analysis, and effective communication.</p> <p>The course supports students in conducting research within their Major, strengthening analytical and problem-solving abilities and preparing them for independent, high-quality research in both traditional and practice-based fields. Students who choose this pathway-whether to enhance their research skills or prepare for graduate school-must adhere to its structured requirements. Students approved for concurrent enrollment in both the Seminar and GRP must follow specific requirements outlined in Weeks 1 and 6.</p>

Contents of class preparation and review	<p># Weekly Assignments: Determined by the instructor.</p> <p># Research Tasks: Conduct preliminary research for your Graduation Research Project (GRP). This includes finding relevant literature, datasets, and methodologies that suit your chosen topic.</p> <p># Presentation Preparation: Prepare presentations outlining your research progress and findings for class discussions.</p> <p># Class Review: Reflect on Feedback: Carefully consider feedback given by the instructor and peers regarding your work. Discussion Points: Summarize key discussion points from the class and note new insights that could improve your research. Update Research Plan: Adjust your research plan as needed based on feedback and the seminar's direction. Advisor Consultation: Schedule regular meetings with your academic advisor for project guidance. 2. AI Policy Finalization in Week 1: In Week 1, each student and their advisor must review, confirm, and finalize the Seminar AI Policy. The agreed AI Policy will be officially recorded and will apply to this Seminar for the remainder of the semester. 3. Concurrent Seminar and GRP Enrollment: It is recommended to complete the seminar before starting your GRP. In exceptional cases, you may request concurrent enrollment, subject to iCLA Management review. 4. Extension Protocol: Extensions for documented hardships (for example, illness or bereavement) must be supported by evidence and requested at least 7 days before the deadline. For extreme unforeseen cases, contact your advisor and the Administrative Office immediately. Extensions for issues within student control are not allowed. The final decision is made by iCLA Management. 5. Communication: Use email for all seminar-related inquiries. 6.
