Course Description	The course will introduce the Japanese economy, business, and industrial structure. It starts from the Edo era of Japan, and end with the most recent development in 2011 – 2023. The Japanese model of economic development will be introduced, including the industrial structure, public finance, monetary policy, and financial systems. The high-speed development of the Japanese economy after World War II will be covered. We will also discuss the current social and economic situations in Japan. A discussion on the Japanese model and whether it can be applied to other countries will be conducted in the classroom.

Students are encouraged to observe the happenings around them in their daily lives. The observations will be discussed in the class to find out the cultures behind them. Events in Japan's economic development and business practices will be discussed as well. Some readings will be assigned before the class and students will review questions from the readings. Students will do presentations on Japanese figures in history and features in Japanese economy and business.
