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Course Description	Internship is an academic program which aims to have students experiential learning opportunity that enhances knowledge and skill development in a professional setting. Students can earn academic credit when they successfully complete an internship. This work/learning arrangement is overseen by a faculty staff member of iCLA who are especially designated for this program. The internship is different from the part time job in terms of its characteristics regardless of whether it will be paid or unpaid. The experience that distinguishes it from other types of work is one or more forms of structured and deliberate reflection contained within learning agenda or objectives. Independent research projects guided by the faculty members or volunteer works that make students to learn about their current level of abilities and skills could also be included in the program. Internships may provide (1) an opportunity for students to test their aptitude and interest in a particular profession before committing to it: (2) an opportunity for the prospective employer to judge the suitability of the student for a possible career position at the institution: (3) an opportunity for students to develop interpersonal skills that are different from those developed at the university, and (4) an opportunity for students to develop employment references that may be useful when students begin job hunting.
