	Cap (registrant capacity): 20 students
	Students will learn basic grammatical structures and situational/functional expressions used in various situations (CEFR A2 level). The class is conducted basically in a flipped mode and students are required to understand the grammar patterns prior to class using textbooks and materials in UNIPA. In class, through oral/written practice and activities, students will expand their knowledge, enhance their language skills, and improve their communication skills.
	A project, which is conducted in a group work format, will give students opportunities to practice conducting a survey, creating a questionnaire, dealing with data, making an analysis, creating PPT, and making a presentation.
Course Description	Students will also learn and deepen their understanding of some aspects of Japanese culture throughout this course.
	Approximately 70% of class instruction and interaction will be conducted in Japanese with occasional English explanations when necessary.
	This course is for students who have completed Japanese 2 (JPNL 112) at iCLA or the equivalent level elsewhere. All students in this course should preview and review the material thoroughly and are expected to study at least five hours outside of class hours per week.
Class plan based on course evaluation from previous academic year	Based on feedback from students in previous semesters, classes will be conducted in a flipped mode. Students are expected to preview vocabulary and grammar before the session so that they can concentrate on the actual use and practice during the session.

Learning Goals	At the end of this course, proficient students will be able to: Read, write, and understand meanings of approx. 90 new kanji with their kanji compounds in addition to those learned in JI-J2 courses. Recognize and use vocabulary and grammar patterns required for this level. Communicate and exchange information using four skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) about matters in areas of immediate relevance and continue communication without offending people. Improve fluency/appropriateness and use strategies when communicating in Japanese. Set a theme and prepare a questionnaire as a group project, analyze data, and make a presentation of the results in class (in Japanese/English). Deepen their understanding of Japanese culture.

Active Learning Methods		
More details/supplemental information on Active Learning Methods	The classes are conducted in a flipped mode. Students are expected to read and understand the grammar by reading the Grammar Notes in the textbook, and to take "before the class" quizzes on UNIPA to check the understanding prior to the class. A small scale discussion (in both Japanese and English) and group work will be included in class activities. Students are expected to discover rules and their backgrounds from those activities. At the end of the semester students will make a presentation on what they find in the project. Students are encouraged to make a presentation in Japanese.	
Use of ICT	Students are expected to complete simple grammar quizzes on UNIPA in order to make themselves ready for the class activities. During the class, PPT slides, video, audio will be extensively used. Google form/Google documents will be used to enhance group works in class. Students are expected to type Japanese characters (hiragana, katakana, kanji) properly on their computers. For the second submissions of compositions, students are allowed to use Al translations for a checking purpose (i.e. to compare what they have written and Al translations).	
Contents of class preparation and review	Students are expected to complete simple grammar quizzes on UNIPA in order to make themselves ready for the class activities. Students also need to work on vocabulary of the lesson prior to class. After the class daily workbook exercises allows students to check in the writing format what they learned and practiced orally in class. It is also required to memorize kanji and kanji compounds to extend vocabulary after the class (approximately 16-18 kanji are introduced per lesson). Composition exercises give students opportunity to explore free writing using the knowledge they have acquired, and to experience rewriting and polishing what is written.	
Feedback Methods	Daily workbook/task feedback will be done individually through class homework box in front of the instructor's room/emails/LMS. Lesson tests/oral tests feedback will be done individually through emails/LMS, or individual consultation (face-to-face or zoom).
