Course Description	What is literature? One can say that it is language art, but it is abstract. You may have noticed that when people use the word "literature" casually they simply mean a good story with some quality, but one of the most important aspects of appreciating literature academically is to understand the difference between story and representation. A story is a means to represent something else, so that the reader should NOT stop at understanding stories but rather examine how they work. As such, Literature Appreciation will explore poetry, fiction, and nonfiction, in order to cultivate the basic skills to understand literary works.  There will be a special emphasis on close reading of literary language and the manner in which language and content require critical thinking, represent imaginative thinking, and merge thought with feeling.  This course aims to enrich students' learning experiences by various types of active learning activities, such as in-class discussion, debate, group work, and peer review.
