More details/supplemental information on Active Learning Methods	This course involves a collaborative learning environment where students are required to share their work for evaluation by both their peers and the instructor. This process functions as a form of learning competition, gradually familiarizing students with the standards expected in high-level research papers/projects.			
Use of ICT	This course utilizes various tools, including Google Scholar for searching, EndNote for referencing, Excel for data management, and SPSS and NVivo for statistical and qualitative analysis, respectively. Additional software may also be introduced as needed.			
Contents of class preparation and review	Throughout the course, students will engage in a portfolio of activities conducted during class sessions as well as outside the classroom, with each activity corresponding to an assignment for submission. These assignments will contribute to the final evaluation of the course, aligning with the course rubric.
